



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THE SALVATION ARMY SHELTER FOR WOMEN A REFUGE OF HOPE A SALVATION ARMY SHELTER FOR WOMEN

The Emergency Shelter within The Salvation Army's Centre of Hope on Gladys Avenue has undergone a major transformation. This past September, a new space was created to accommodate up to ten women. In addition to being a clean and warm place to sleep, the Women's Shelter residents can access nutritious meals, showers, laundry facilities, medical attention, counselling and referral services, and securely store their belongings. This renovation has enabled the Shelter to increase its overall capacity to thirty-five beds year-round.

"The women used to be housed in a separate room within the main shelter – six beds for women and nineteen beds for men. By creating this new space we have provided them with more privacy and a greater sense of security and therefore a greater sense of dignity", Al Breitkreuz, Program Manager – Outreach, Shelter & Family Services.



RESTORATION • HOPE FOR THE FUTURE • HEALING

Many of the women we see in the shelter are victims of abuse, sex trafficking and exploitation. We are committed to providing assistance, compassion, and a holistic approach, so they can begin to heal.

A shelter staff member, "Gloria" experienced hardship on the streets with addiction and homelessness. She shares with the women that they are God's beautiful works of art and that they have value. She sees parts of herself in so many of them, and it breaks her heart because she remembers how terribly painful it was to be in their position. Many people showed her kindness along the way - she wasn't always able to accept it - but she never forgot them.

Gloria's wounds are being healed as she takes care of others. The idea of preserving her own dignity was foreign to her. She sees that in a lot of the women at the shelter and she follows the example of those who treated her as though her dignity meant something even though she didn't believe it.

Gloria feels very motherly towards the women in the shelter, no matter what their age. In her addictions she didn't mature at all, and it wasn't until she began to walk with God at the age of 52 that she started to grow up.

Gloria shares -"When I wash and fold their laundry, I'm always mindful of a moment in my old life when a nurse handed me a change of clothes after a traumatic experience." The clothes were folded, and something about this motherly touch broke through all the barriers she had up, for just a moment, and she felt somehow comforted. Gloria is now paying that forward when she folds the residents' laundry.

THE SALVATION ARMY'S CENTRE OF HOPE MEDICAL CLINIC YIELDS POSITIVE OUTCOMES

The Centre of Hope's Clinic has been in operation for over six years and will have over 2,600 visits in 2019.

Recent additional funding received from Fraser Health will increase the doctor's hours from one to two times per week. Having a Doctor on site for extended hours, along with a full-time Licensed Nurse Practitioner and a part time Nurse Practitioner is key in providing preventative care and support to those vulnerable to illness – particularly as extreme weather approaches.

Fraser Health and the Division involved its research teams to analyze the Clinic's work and found patients who regularly used the Clinic visited the emergency room 36% less, and the number of hospital overnight stays decreased by 30%.

As the homeless population increases, more resources are needed to continue to meet its needs. The clinic welcomes financial support as well as donations of medical supplies and equipment to further improve the services provided to patients.
