SIL SUCCESSES

The Salvation Army's Supportive Independent Living (SIL) program, at the Centre of Hope in Abbotsford, has been designed to provide safe, affordable, secure housing for men. Residents accepted into the program are part of community living. They come from all spectrums of society and want to move forward and make significant changes in their life. They may be homeless or at risk of homelessness; completing an addictions recovery program; needing support due to emotional or mental health issues; struggling with interpersonal or societal issues;







integrating into society after incarceration; unemployment or

unemployable and wanting to learn new skills.

In 2020 there were many successes in the SIL program. 6 residents found housing, 4 completed the 12 step program and 2 were successful in securing student loans to further their education. Amadiel and Tyrone have just been hired at the Centre of Hope as on call casual shelter workers. Congratulations to them both.

MAKING A DIFFERENCE TOGETHER!

The Salvation Army, Abbotsford
Fire and Rescue Service, Emergency
Social Services (ESS), Animal Rescue,
businesses and residents of Abbotsford
and surrounding communities went into
rescue, recovery, compassion and care
mode following the February 14th, 2021 fire

at the Delair Court apartments. The fire broke out at 1:30am and within a couple of hours Emergency Social Services and The Salvation Army had set up a rescue operation centre at neighbouring Cascade Community Church.

"It was a privilege to offer prompt and convenient respite for the residents in various stages of sleepy shock in the middle of the night. We were grateful for several Cascade Court residents who jumped into action as volunteers to assist with refreshments and other needs. Both Ron Hull & Craig Leighton (Abbotsford Assistant Fire Chiefs) personally expressed their gratitude to The Salvation Army for being so accessible and able to provide good emergency reception service", says Captain Ian Gillingham, Cascade Community Church.

"The Abbotsford Emergency Disaster Services (EDS) team did a great job responding quickly and effectively to the Delair fire. They provided food and emotional and spiritual care to over two hundred evacuated residents and almost one hundred first responders", stated Ian Pollard, Divisional Director of Emergency Disaster Services.

The outpouring of support started immediately. Within forty eight hours - twenty five Go Fund Me pages had been created by residents of Abbotsford and surrounding communities, an invaluable resource - Help for Delair Court Facebook page was up and running and the phone calls started coming into The Salvation Army's Centre of Hope asking for information on how to help. Donations of clothing and household items began to flood into the Thrift Store.

New Life Church opened their hearts and facility and became a Market place for all of the community donations. The Market place remained open for one week for residents to shop and choose from thousands of items to help them re-build.

New Life also boxed and stored the items for those who had yet to find a new home, or were waiting to return to their homes.

Cascade Church was transformed into a recovery centre and ESS staff and volunteers were on site to meet with all of the residents, assess their needs and make arrangements for a wide variety of urgent needs, food, accommodations, special medical equipment, etc.

The Salvation Army quickly put a plan into place that included: EDS volunteers provided snacks plus hot and cold beverages for everyone in the recovery centre. They also provided meals to ESS staff and volunteers as they remained on site through the first week.

Each resident of both buildings were given \$100 vouchers they could redeem at The Salvation Army's Thrift Store.

Food was purchased for three hundred hampers that were delivered to residents in Building A when they were allowed to return to their homes on March 5th. Food hampers, a set of frying pans and a \$500 gift card, to help with future needs, were provided to each unit in Building B.

Thank you to over one hundred financial donors whose generosity made it possible to provide for everyone, and to those who continue to donate after the printing of this newsletter. Thank you to this community and beyond who donated thousands of items for the Market Place.
